Election Officials and Inspectors Celebrated in 2024


On November 25, 2024, the Township celebrated election officials and inspectors for their hard work with a reception and proclamation presented at the Board of Trustees meeting. We recognize that without these dedicated individuals, elections could not be held. I want to thank all election workers for their tireless efforts throughout 2024 culminating with November's General Election.

We had just under 80% turnout among the 38,587 registered voters in the Township. Approximately 1.28% less than the 2020 November General Election. That places our community 14th for highest turnout among the 130 municipalities in Oakland County. Absentee and Early Voting numbers continued to rise this election.

While the election season is over, the audit season is just beginning for the Clerk's office. One part of the ongoing effort to ensure accuracy and security is the post-election audit process. Audits occur throughout the state of Michigan. We review processes, procedures, and double check the accuracy of counting machines.

Treasurer's Turn: Explaining Your Tax Bill

As winter sets in, it marks the start of another tax season in the Township Treasurer's Office. Winter tax collection is notably different from summer tax collection earlier in the year because the Township collects all its millages during the winter. These millages account for approximately 70% of the revenue in our annual budget, funding critical services and operations. Here's a breakdown of the millages we collect and how they are used:

- **General Millage (2.1305 mills):** Funds the general operations and administrative functions of the township, ensuring smooth day-to-day management.
- **Roads Millage (0.6654 mills):** Supports the maintenance, repair, cleaning, and snow plowing of neighborhood roads.
- Library Millage (1.8564 mills): Funds our exceptional public library, which is overseen by a separately elected Library Board of Trustees.
- Safety Path Millage (0.4489 mills): Provides for the installation and maintenance of sidewalks and public safety paths throughout the township.
- **Public Safety Millage (6.3809 mills):** Supports police, fire, and dispatch services to keep our community safe. Bloomfield Township is proud to have 65 active-duty firefighters and 72 sworn police officers serving our residents.

- Senior Services Millage (0.3314 mills): Supports the township's senior center and its outstanding programs for older residents.
- **Drains Millage (0.0778 mills):** Repays bonds issued for township drainage improvement projects.
- **Capital Projects Millage (0.3293 mills):** Repays bonds used to construct and improve buildings within the Township Hall campus, completed in 2008.



It's important to note that as a township, we are limited to a maximum of 10 mills for operating millages, unlike cities, which are permitted to levy higher millages.

Our commitment to fiscal responsibility and strategic planning ensures we provide exceptional services while maintaining a tax rate that compares favorably with neighboring communities. Bloomfield Township takes pride in efficient budgeting and maximizing the impact of every dollar. We also prioritize voter input, ensuring residents have a say in the services they value most.



BTFD "Fill The Boot" Proceeds Benefit Muscular Dystrophy Association

On December 9, 2024, the Bloomfield Township Fire Department (BTFD) presented a check to the Muscular Dystrophy Association (MDA). Stacey Breitlow, Account Manager Fire Fighter Partnerships, was present to accept on behalf of the organization. The check totaled \$16,000 and represented the proceeds from the November 27 "Fill The Boot" event.

Breitlow was amazed by the amount raised by BTFD in a one-day event. She addressed the BTFD representatives on hand and stated, "You guys are Rock Stars." She also added, "We are now celebrating 70 years in our partnership with the International Association of Firefighters (IAFF). For 2024, we are looking at over \$10.5 million raised for MDA, here in Michigan."

"Fill The Boot" features firefighters and their family members volunteering to collect donations from residents at various locations such as parking lots and high-traffic intersections. President of the BTFD Charities, Lieutenant Chris Hull, spoke about the success of the event. "Getting people right before Thanksgiving seems to be the perfect time. They are feeling grateful and giving," he stated.

In addition to much-needed research, funds donated to MDA help support their Summer Camp program. Young individuals aged 8 to 17, with neuromuscular disease, have the opportunity to attend these overnight camps around the U.S. - at no cost to their families. Michigan's camp is held at Camp Cavell in Lexington, MI. There are also six MDA Care Centers in the state and over 9,000 individuals currently living with neuromuscular disease.

Hull spoke about the importance of raising these essential funds for individuals living with muscular dystrophy and their families. "We get to see the fruits of our labor. We stay connected with these kids and we see how the money we raise can make a serious impact."

BTPD Trains for Crime Prevention at Places of Worship

Community Relations Officer (CRO) Heather Glowacz | look for a multitude of safety concerns. completed Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design training this Fall. Known as CPTED (pronounced

police agencies 'sep-ted') by internationally, the organization is a multi-disciplinary approach to crime prevention that uses urban and architectural design. Strategies aim to reduce victimization, deter offender decisions that precede criminal acts, and build a sense of community to reduce crime and fear of crimes.

The accredited course is standard training for CROs in Bloomfield Township. "We believe every single resident in the Township deserves the right to feel safe, especially in their place of worship. No matter your beliefs, religion, or creed - we take an oath to protect and serve all people," says Officer Glowacz. There are over a dozen places of worship in the community representing

"We will gladly assess any place of worship and make safety recommendations," says Glowacz. "These could

be as minute a detail as a rusty door hinge to something more in depth like alarm system sensor placement." Ongoing training is essential to keep safety standards at the highest possible level.

"We train frequently for what I refer to as 'low frequency, high risk' situations," says Bloomfield Township Police Chief James Gallagher. "We hope tragedies we see in the national news never come to our doorstep, but we absolutely have to prepare to handle situations like an active assailant. Training that evaluates what went right and wrong in well known events is very beneficial for our officers."

BTPD has a relationship with all places of worship in their

multiple faith communities. CPTED training helps officers to jurisdiction and works regularly to promote and ensure safety.

Senior Services mission to promote wellness, support independence, strengthen the community, and cultivate vitality is receiving a boost with a grant award from Exhale - The Family Caregiver Initiative. This grant not only effects seniors in the community, but their primary caregivers of all ages. It is essential for caregivers to care for themselves, as well as find a supportive community. BTSS is excited to host complimentary Caregiver Connect Groups with upcoming meetings on Thursday, January 16 and Thursday, February 13.

Caregiver Connect will offer wellness programs, evidencebased caregiver education, and leisurely learning; as well as include a meal and facilitated support discussions. While they attend, their person in care will attend adult day services courtesy of newly re-opened Friendship Club. Exhale funding does not end here, but also provides for caregivers and receivers to participate together in the Companion Café.

Companion Café offers creative, social, and enjoyable activities in a safe, positive, and supportive setting. Bloomfield Hills Rotary Club provided startup funding in 2023 and feedback was resoundingly positive. The Exhale grant now ensures that this monthly program will remain active and complimentary for the year ahead.
