### Services Cut in 2019 Have All Returned in 2024

### Spring Is A Chance for New Beginnings and A Brighter Future

Spring is a chance to focus on where we've been, clean up messes, repair what's broken, and make improvements as we charge forward into sunnier days.

When reflecting on 2019, the challenges Bloomfield Township faced were intense:

- a structural deficit of \$164 million dollars;
- an emergency \$4 million budget crisis due to changes in state laws regarding liabilities; and
- staffing was being reduced and services were being cut.

Then in March of 2020 a global pandemic followed that continued the reduction of services and growth. Since 2020, new leadership at the administration, board, and department head levels were able to mix institutional knowledge from their predecessors with new eyes and fresh ideas that developed a recipe for success. Incrementally, year by year, cut services have been restored! And due to changes made in the way we budget, investments thriving, and innovations made to procedures and technology, we have reached the point where this year marks the moment that all services are restored. Even more notable is that we created a capital reserve fund two years ago that has grown to allow liquid access to capital funds so we are better protected against any emergency issues like those of 2019 and 2020.

My fellow neighbors and residents have consistently asked to bring back the programs that we lost. I am excited to announce that in addition to household waste days, both the Operation Clean Sweep and supplemental road funding are all back as well! I truly hope you will take part in Clean Sweep with your Home Owners Association or fellow neighbors, so we can keep Bloomfield Township beautiful together. Additionally, although the roads in our Township are owned by the County and the State, we as residents have high expectations and that is why Bloomfield is the only Township in the State of Michigan with a road department to better address the concerns of those failing roads. In 2019, about \$750,000 was cut from our annual road department which drastically reduced our maintenance programs. This year we brought back \$1,750,000 to the department and will once again be able to address some of the overlays and cape seal options that will help extend the life of some roads. You can learn more details on all of these programs throughout the newsletter.

Even with our financial outlook improving, we can't sustain exceptional services without amazing employees. For many decades there has been a significant decline in the number of people going into public service and that is an area we are

innovating as well. Public Service is not just a calling, it is a wonderful career choice that fits all generations. However, the way we recruit and the conversation itself needed to change in order to attract and retain our extraordinary team to serve you. Currently, there is a national shortage of skilled trade workers, police and fire personnel, specialized areas of urban planning, civil engineering, department of public works, and assessing. Discussions with our federal representative, Congresswoman Haley Stevens, her staff, and I continue as we work together to address the situation at the national level by changing the way we promote public service to more Millennials and Generation Z.

In addition to working with our federal leaders, Bloomfield Township changed the way we actively recruit as well. In 2023, our police department and cable department worked together to create a media recruitment campaign. Not only did the Cable Department win awards and recognition at the national level for the recruitment campaign, but it directly resulted in some of our most recent hires finding us online and choosing the Township based on the videos they saw highlighting the culture of the team. Similarly, we

began using a national recruiting firm to help with specialized positions that aren't common degrees anymore, but are still part of the backbone of public service. A "come back to Michigan" campaign to attract Michiganders that left over the years, but want to come back and be a part of the resurgence of the Detroit Metro area is in place.

Another change we have made to recruit enthusiastic talent is presenting municipal departments as the live version of their favorite video games, such as SimCity or Minecraft. By changing the conversation and the way we engage with more recent generations, it helps them envision what it is like to be a part of urban planning, civil engineering, public works, and assessing. By adapting the way we recruit and speak with candidates, it not only improves our staffing in the Township, but also increases the awareness and interest in public service. If you know of someone who is looking for something more fulfilling, and also wants to give back to the community, join the conversation with us and guide them to public service where they can help themselves and communities to grow and thrive.

### Clerk's Office 2023 Facts & Figures

While we offer many services at the Clerk's Office, maintaining the voter rolls is one of our top priorities. In fact, in 2023 we completed 4,063 voter transactions. This in a year when Michigan Election Law had the most sweeping changes in a century (blue box at right).

Passport application processing is the 2nd most common service we provide. We have been accepting passport applications

for almost nineteen years and, excluding 2020, we average over 1,000 passport applications each year. In 2023, we processed 1,532 passport applications. I am extremely proud to share that we are a five-time recipient of a perfect score from the U.S. Department of State Audit. Approximately 80% of our applicants are from Bloomfield Township, but anyone may apply for a passport with us—as

**Election Law Changes** 

- Nine days of Early Voting before Election Day (done in conjunction with Oakland County) at the **Bloomfield Township Public** Library.
- Apply once and always receive an absentee ballot by mail. This Permanent Mail Ballot list has grown to 13,014 (37.6% of our voters).
- Voters can personally tabulate their absentee ballot during Early Voting or at their precinct on Election Day.
- Absentee signature curing on a ballot envelope until 5PM on the third day after an election.
- Absent voter drop boxes are required and we added two more, totaling four across the Township.

Treasurer's Turn: Understanding Your Property Taxes and Assessment

If you moved to the Township in the last year, congratulations and welcome! One thing I hear frequently from new residents is that their property taxes increase considerably after their first year. That's due to Proposal A of 1994, where taxes are "uncapped" in the year following a home's change of ownership.

Here's the good news. Proposal A was a constitutional amendment put in place in large part to "cap" or limit the increases in property taxes when residents stay in their homes. The amendment introduced the "Taxable Value" of a home, which is how property taxes are calculated (Taxable Value x Millage Rate). However, the Assessor still tracks the market value of your house, where "Assessed Value" is set to half of the market value. But no matter how much your home's Assessed Value may increase, your taxes each year can only go up by the rate of inflation or 5%, whichever is less. Extrapolating forward, your home's Assessed Value may increase at a higher rate than your Taxable Value, which works to your benefit in keeping increases to your taxes down.

On the flip side, when a resident sells their home, the new owner will see their Taxable Value "uncap" and it is reset to match the home's Assessed Value. This can lead to an issue when residents escrow their taxes with their mortgage company. The mortgage company will pay the tax bill we send them, but if there is an unexpected increase due to uncapping, the mortgage company may increase your escrow payment each month to account for the difference.

### 2024 Set to be a Very Big Year for Road Preservation and Rehabilitation in Bloomfield Township

Supervisor Dani Walsh and Public Works Director Noah Mehalski have prioritized road repairs in a big way, allocating 1.75 million dollars to the program in 2024. This will be over one million dollars more than the Township has ever dedicated to road repairs for a given year. This will directly impact the residents of Bloomfield Township as all of the work will be performed on subdivision roads.

### Why not use the funds to replace roads completely?

The Road Commission for Oakland County and Michigan Department of Transportation own all of the public roads in the Township. To maintain and

preserve the subdivision roads, Bloomfield Township has a maintenance contract with the RCOC made possible by Public Act 51. The framework of the legislature does not allow Bloomfield Township to completely replace the roads. Complete road replacement requires the S.A.D. process. for road preservation based on the material and condition of the road. This will include asphalt overlays, sectional concrete slab replacement, cape seal, and micro seal. This is in addition to the regular maintenance performed such as joint sealing, over-banding, pothole patching, and spray patching. Each method will provide an improved road surface that seeks to extend the life of the road and enhance the driving surface. The Department of Public Works does exhaustive research to find the most advanced, long-lasting, and efficient methods available.

### How is it determined which streets get attention?

The Road Division staff are continually evaluating the subdivision roads within Bloomfield Township. Living in Michigan, the condition of a road can change dramatically from fall to spring. Having a flexible and adaptable preservation plan is imperative. The Road Division Foreman and his staff maintain and adjust the preservation program as needed throughout the year. We target the worst of the worst and utilize a dynamic process based on field conditions, resident feedback, and staff evaluations.

### When To Get a Permit

Spring is a popular time for homeowners to start taking on new projects. Before you start adding that deck, building a shed, installing a pool, or constructing a fence, it is important to know what's required by the Township. All accessory structures, such as play structures, sunrooms, air conditioners, etc. require a permit. In some cases, these projects may also require approval from a homeowners association or approval from Zoning Board of Appeals.

### Electronic Waste, Medication Disposal and Paper Shredding Drop-Off Day Returns May 4th!

The Township's annual Electronic Waste Drop-Off Day is scheduled for Saturday, May 4 from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. While doing your spring cleaning, pack up any used and unwanted electronic devices such as TVs, computers, monitors, digital cameras, toner cartridges, or DVD/VCR players to recycle.

Sort through your medicine cabinets for unused or expired medications for safe disposal. Box up any confidential and personal documents that you want shredded securely.

On the day of the event, there will be two entrances on

Andover Road (from Long Lake and Telegraph). Volunteers will unload everything from your car, so you won't even need

to exit your vehicle. Have your ID out and ready to show volunteers, as this event is open to Township residents only.

### Police and Fire Team Up to Offer Emergency Notification Alert System to Residents

Public launched Safety has "Bloomfield Alerts" powered by OnSolve. This emergency notification svstem will enable Bloomfield Township public safety personnel to notify our community by telephone, text message, email, and more. This time-sensitive notification system can reach thousands of individuals in minutes to ensure information is more quickly shared.

Any message regarding the safety of our residents and community will be disseminated using Bloomfield Alerts. We will send out time-sensitive information in emergencies, or urgent alerts in situations including boil water notices, gas leaks, evacuation notices,

police activity, fire emergencies, missing persons, and more. This is a voluntary community alert system to ensure that residents and our community remain informed of important information.

Registration is completely free and sign up is easy. Simply text "BTALERTS" to 24639 or go to https://accountportal.onsolve. net/bloomfieldtwp to register. You will be required to input your residential or commercial address during registration. This system is precise enough to target specific parts of our community with an exact area of impact, so that only those people who are affected by an emergency situation are notified.

Bloomfield Alerts will help you informed and prepared for any emergency that may occur in our area. Officials will send messages to alert you only of emergency details, instructions or precautions that you need in order to make well-informed decisions and remain

safe. Be prepared; register today!
